





- 1. Allingham, William. Laurence Bloomfield. London: Reeves & Turner, 1890. Revised Edition. Original vellum backed, light blue cloth, gilt lettering on spine. Tipped in portrait frontispiece. 152pp. Presentation Copy from the author's wife, Helen Allingham, noted watercolor painter. Usual foxing to title-page which bleeds through from frontispiece (found in nearly all copies). Near fine. (#1291) \$225
- 2. Allingham, William. **Day and Night Songs.** London: George Routledge and Co., 1854. First edition. Three quarter calf, marbled endpapers (modern). Woodcut frontispiece by Walter Howell Deverell. Allingham's celebrated poems which came to be the focal point of the Pre-Raphaelite's early illustrations in the very next year. (#1301) \$450
- 3. Allingham, William. **Fifty Modern Poems.** London: Bell and Daldy, 1865. First edition. Original green cloth with gilt lettering on spine. 183pp with 32pp prospectus at end. Occasional light foxing, corners bumped, a nice copy of an early Allingham title. (#1294)
- 4. Allingham, William. Flower Pieces and Other Poems. London: Reeves and Turner, 1888. First edition. Original green cloth with blindstamped design, gilt lettering on spine, dark green endpapers. 194pp. Two woodcut illustrations by Dante Gabriel Rossetti including his famous "Maids of Elfin-Mere" as frontispiece. This collection contains over 120 poems by Allingham. Very good. A scarce Allingham title. (#1328) \$275
- 4. Allingham, William. **Day and Night Songs**. London: G. Philip & Sons, 1884. First edition thus. Blue cloth with superb sunrise design and lettering in gold on cover, gilt-tooled spine. Head & tailpieces, initials throughout. Covers sl. wear, very good. Scarce. (#255)
- 6. Arnold, Matthew. **Empedocles on Etna.** London: B. Fellowes, 1852. First edition. Original gray-green cloth with elaborate blindstamped design on both covers, gilt spine. Graham Pollard Copy. Inscribed in pencil on verso of front fly, **"Roger Senhouse from Lytton Strachey."** 236 pp. with the "Strayed Reveller" ad at end, plus two pages. Expertly rebacked (barely visible). A clean, tight copy, very good. (#1336) \$750



7. Arnold, Matthew. Poems. Second Series. London: Longman, Brown, Green, and Longmans, 1855. First edition. Original green cloth with elaborate blindstamped design on both covers, gilt lettering on spine. Presentation inscription on verso of front free fly, "From the Author," probably from publisher's clerk. A gorgeous copy with minimal wear, near fine. (#1297) \$325



8. Badnall, Richard. Zelinda; A Persian Tale. London: Whittaker, Treacher & Co., 1830. First edition. Bound in full contemporary wavy grain calf with bold gilt vine and blossom pattern on both covers and spine, beautiful crimson wavy silk endsheets. Inscribed by the author to his son, William Badnall. A fascinating and vanishingly scarce book of poetry by Richard Badnall, silk, ribbon and button tycoon of the early 1800's in Leek, Staffordshire and a man whose riches to rags story could make an entertaining if not sad novel. Through bad investments, he lost his fortune and nearly landed in debtor's prison. Somehow, during this time he seemed to be able to write poetry, and this volume was received with some praise, though acclaim never landed Badnall reputation, much less remuneration from his writings. He also wrote a treatise on Silk Trade (1828), a book on politics (183) and another on Railroad Improvement (1833), all exceedingly rare. Besides our copy of Zelinda, no copies of any of these books were found at the time of research. Laid in is a handwritten memo from the Society of Genealogists of London, from Howard H. Cotterell, explaining some details of Badnall's lineage and also citing some of his works mentioned here. Bookplate of Russell Markland. Some rubbing to calf. Book is near fine internally. 
9. Blair, Robert, The Grave, A Poem. London: T. Bensley for the proprietor, R. H. Cromek, 1808. First edition. Folio size. Bound in contemporary threequarter calf, marbled boards with modern calf backing matching original style, gilt rules and florets, black morocco label with gilt lettering. Original endsheets. Portrait etched frontispiece of Blake after T. Phillips, title-page and eleven plates by William Blake, all engraved by the inimitable and accomplished Luigi Schiavonetti. Boards only slightly worn, a superb copy with very slight browntoning to titlepage. All of the Blake plates are exceptionally clean and bright. A tight, exemplary copy of a lasting rarity. 10. Borrow, George. Lavengro; The Scholar, The Gypsy, The Priest. London: John Murray, 1851. First edition. Three volumes. Original fine wove blue-green cloth with blindstamped borders, printed paper labels on spines. Both first and second volumes with ads dated February, 1851 and January, 1851, respectively. Volume three without ads. Slightly cocked, a few hinges cracked, others integral. Covers rubbed, spine ends a bit frayed, corners bumped. Engraved portrait in volume one a bit browntoned. A very good set, one of the great novels of the period. (#1341)



Original gray blindstamped cloth, spine lettered in gilt. Front cover has rectangular discoloration as if something has been removed, covers worn, corners chipped. Internally clean and bright. - 14. Browning, Robert. Christmas-Eve and Easter-Day. A Poem. London: Chapman & Hall, 1850. First edition. Original brown cloth with blindstamped oval design on both covers, gilt lettering on spine. First binding state (Carter A). William Bell Scott's Copy, with his bookplate attached to front pastedown. A superb copy, very fine. (#1327) [see photo right] \$850



Bound in a simple full red crushed morocco binding by Zahnsdorf with raised bands and gilt lettering on spine, inner dentelles lavishly tooled, marbled endpapers. TEG, others uncut. 216pp. On the rear cover, a label has been pasted-in, presumably from original paper binding. With the bookplate Cuthbert Headlam. Cover has small spot, else near fine copy of Browning's second book. (#1322)\$850

18. Browning, Robert. **Sordello.** London: Edward Moxon, 1840. First edition. Original drab boards, 253pp, 16pp. First issue with half-title, publisher's prospectus at end dated 1 January, 1840 (as called for). Browning's scarce fourth book which didn't sell well. Spine worn down to under-webbing, hinges cracked, corners bumped, else a very clean and bright copy, internally fine. (#1300) \$1,250



19. Buchanan, Robert. The Fleshly School of Poetry and Other Phenomena of the Day [With ALS from Buchanan tipped-in]. London: Strahan and Co., 1872. First edition. Original printed wrappers with engraved illustration on cover of wild garlic, hound's tongue, etc. (odiferous flowers). Celebrated and influential, if not scathing treatise accusing the Pre-Raphaelite artists of, among immorality and perhaps helping to increase PRB exposure through subsequent dialogues. Most notably was D.G. Rossetti's rebuttal which came in the form of a letter in the Athenaeum entitled, "The Stealthy School of Criticism." An excellent copy in its original printed wrapper and with most of the spine still present (rarely seen). A three-page autograph letter by Buchanan asking a Miss Marie de Hey if she would like to purchase "Madcap Prince" for her own use... "only once reproduced in town-- for Mis ??'s benefit at the Olympic last May. I fancy the part would suit you, and the piece is light and effective enough. Or I could arrange with you for a new picturesque narrative drama for starry purposes(??)." Some tears in ALS, corners of book slightly bent and covers only faintly age-marked, else very good or better. Internally clean and bright. A rare offering. (#934)



- 20. Byron, George Gordon, Lord. Finden's Illustrations of the Life and Works of Lord Byron [Fine Copy in Sumptuous Full Morocco]. London: John Murray, 1833-34. First edition. Three Volumes. Bound in full exquisite maroon polished calf, wide gilt floral and ornate border design on both covers, other blindstamped borders, spine with raised bands and five panels, two of which in black calf, five gilt decorative panels, marbled endpapers and edges. 126 exquisite plates engraved by William and Edward Finden after paintings by Turner, Stanfield, Westall and others. An extremely attractive set, contents fine, some light foxing to plates, usual browning and very slight wear to binding which still has original sheen. (#1065)
- 21. Byron, George Gordon Noel . Hours of Idleness, A Series of Poems, Original and Translated. Newark: S. and J. Ridge, 1807. First Edition, Later Printing. Finely bound in full dark brown crushed morocco with gilt ruled borders, three-dot motif in corners, five wrap-around embossed strapwork devices connecting five raised bands which have gilt ruled borders. A fine copy of the rare first edition with later issue points. (#937) \$1,750



- 22. Byron, George Gordon Noel, Lord. The Works of Lord Byron [With Three Contemporary Fore-Edge Paintings]. London: John Murray, 1819. First edition. Three volumes. Contemporary full green straight-grained morocco elaborately tooled in gilt and blind on both covers, spine with four raised bands and heavily gilt compartments. A.E.G. With three superb contemporary fore-edge paintings on each volume: Vol. 1 of Sheffield Park, Sussex, the grand mansion across a lake, with fishermen on the bank and a few swans; Vol. II of Hayley, Staffordshire, a small, les grand manor house with cows and sheep in a field, along with the shepherd and his dog; Vol. III of Haddon Hall, Derbyshire, castlelike building across a river spanned by a stone bridge over which a peasant woman herds several cows. Steel-engraved plates from paintings by Thomas Stothard. Covers scuffed at edges and corners, spines slightly rubbed, occasional foxing within, else a very good, attractive set made more desirable by the three matching fore-edge paintings. This copy last on the market in 2003 where it sold for \$1200 (including buyer's premium) at PBA Galleries. (#1066) \$1,500
- 23. Byron, Lord. **Manfred; A Dramatic Poem.** London: John Murray, 1817. First edition, Second Printing. Bound in superb full tan polished calf with three parallel gilt lines and florets at corners, five raised bands, two morocco inlaid compartments, heavily gilt on spine. Ornate inner doublures. Half-title present. Wise's first edition, second issue and Randolph's first edition, first issue. In any event, the scarcer edition with no quotation from Hamlet on title page. An elegant, fine copy. With bookplate of William Arthur, 6th Duke of Portland. (#936)
- 24. Carroll, Lewis. An Index to "In Memoriam" London: Edward Moxon & Co., 1862. First edition. 12mo. Original fine-pebbled dark brown cloth over flexible boards. 40pp. Under the auspices of Tennyson, Carroll compiled and edited this helpful adjunct to his famous poem, though, it as been reported, with much of the arduous work being accomplished by Carroll's sisters. A fine copy. Rarely seen, especially in this condition. (#1283)



- 25. Chambers, Robert. **Traditions of Edinburgh.** Edinburgh: W. & C. Tait, 1825. First edition. 12mo. Two volumes. Half calf, marbled boards and endpapers. Rubbing to marbled paper, wear to corners sides of spine. Internally clean and tight. There is an excellent original pencil portrait sketch at back of volume 1 date Oct 15, 1840. (#975)
- 26. Chapone, Mrs. Letters on the Improvement of the Mind. London: Scatcherd and Letterman, Longman, Hurst, Rees, Orme, and Brown; Cadell and Davies, etc., 1820. New Edition. Contemporary full smooth blindstamped tan calf, gilt spine. Early edition of this classic, the first edition of which is quite rare. Small piece bottom of spine missing, moderate wear, internally near fine. (#981)




27. Clough, Arthur Hugh, and Thomas Burbidge. Ambarvalia. Poems. London and Oxford: Chapman and Hall; Francis Macpherson, 1849. First edition. Original elaborately blind-stamped brown cloth, gilt lettering on spine. With the bookplate of Oscar Browning comprising a woodcut by Simeon Solomon engraved by Swain and dated in the plate, 1870. As well, with the ownership stamp of Lytton Strachey,

founding member of Bloomsbury group. This is an extremely scarce and interesting

collection of poems, the more prized for the work of Arthur Clough whose poems were well-known and who was the assistant to the famed nurse, Florence Nightingale. A very nice copy indeed, the binding quite clean and unmarked, near fine internally. (#1317)




28. Collins, Wilkie. **Man and Wife.** New York: Harper & Brothers, 1870. First American edition. Original brown cloth, gilt spine. July ads (earliest). Sl. stain endpapers, foxing, overall clean and tight gilt on spine bright. (#993) \$175



29. Collins, Wilkie. **Mr. Wray's Cash-Box.** London: Richard Bentley, 1852. First edition. Original blue blind-stamped wavy-line cloth, cream endpapers, four pages of undated ads in rear. So early in Collins' career that he used W. Wilkie Collins. Superb frontispiece illustration by **J. E. Millais**, co-fonder of the Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood, his first illustration in book form. This stunning first edition is rarely seen in fine condition in the original cloth without rebacking. Our copy quite nearly so, near fine, with very slight fading to spine, corners only slightly rubbed, front hinge cracked. (#1290)


30. Cory, William Johnson. Ionica. London: Smith, Elder and Co., 1858. First Edition. Original green fineribbed cloth, gilt lettering on spine. Published anonymously, this book of delicate poems has been said heralded as the first book of what is now called Uranian Poetry, a small group of pederastic poets who published works between 1858 and 1930. Cory, as many other Uranian poets, was steeped in Latin and Greek and his early poems show lyrical quality esteemed by his peers. Spine sunned with small tear, worn at extremities, hinges cracked. Very scarce and historically significant



book. No other copies located at time of research. (#1319) \$550

31. Crabbe, George. **Tales and Miscellaneous Poems.** London: H.G. Bohn, 1847. Bound in green polished calf, gilt spine. A rare imprint and early printing of this title. Covers soiled and worn in places, internally near fine. James Drummond's copy, Earl of Perth. (#967)


32. Crabbe, George. **Tales of the Hall.** London: John Murray, 1819. First edition. Two volumes. Half contemporary light brown calf, marbled boards. Crabbe's last book published during his lifetime. Covers worn, but a very clean, tight and bright copy. (#964) \$350





Title-page with large woodcut illustration of angel statue in garden. Uncut. Boards soiled, corners rubbed, spine lacking. A nice copy, quite tight with both hinges intact. Scarce. (#945)

34. D'Israeli, I. **Romances** Second Edition, Corrected to which is now added, A Modern Romance. London: Murray and Highley, 1801. Second edition. Bound in full calf, gilt spine with morocco label. Binding a bit worn on edges, spine split and partially repaired. Internally clean and bright. (#976) \$450

35. Dickens, Charles. **Hard Times.** London: Bradbury & Evans, 1854. First edition. Original green blindstamped cloth, gilt lettering on cover. First issue with "Price 5/-" at base of spine and p.244 misnumbered as 44. Expertly rebacked to match, original yellow endpapers retained, though not integral. Clean and bright internally. A very good copy of the scarce first issue. (#1337) \$1,200



36. Edgeworth, Maria. **Leonora.** London: J. Johnson, 1806. First edition. Two volumes. Bound in contemporary full mottled calf, gilt spines. Moderate wear to calf, some splitting along margins of spine, one very small piece missing from top of one spine. Internally clean and bright. Scarce Edgeworth title. (#978) \$550



37. Gilchrist, Alexander. **Life of William Blake.** London and Cambridge: Macmillan and Co., 1863. First edition. Two volumes. Original fine-pebbled brown cloth with superb ornately pictorial gilt front covers and intricately blindstamped rear covers, gilt lettering on spines. Original green endpapers. Frontispiece engraving by Jeens in volume 1 and exquisite folding plate in volume two engraved by Charles Simms. Full of Blake illustrations, the definitive work on Blake to this point. A heavy two volume set, rarely seen in presentable condition, our copy in superb condition with slight wear to extremities and both bindings in need of strengthening. Unsophisticated and untouched. - 38. Grant, Herbert. **Odes of Horace**. London: Harrison & Sons, 1885. First edition. Original green cloth with gilt stamped design on both covers and spine designed by Dante Gabriel Rossetti and used on G.T. Romanes' Poems (1889). Presentation Copy with full size slip pasted onto front pastedown with "United Service Club" seal (this may be publisher clerk presentation). Spine with small piece missing, wear at joints, internally fine. At time of research, only copy found. (#1325)
- 39. Gray, John ed. [Fine Binding] Hatchards Nouveau Style: The Poems of John Suckling. London: Hacon & Ricketts, The Vale Press, 1896. First edition thus. Bound in green crushed morocco with Nouveau gilt stamped design on cover; five raised bands on spine, gilt designs on five compartments, gilt stamped designs on inner dentelles, by HATCHARDS The binding has been expertly repaired along the hinges, both sides by Carolina Veenstra. Corners rubbed, sl. foxing. (#567)
- 40. Hallam, Arthur Henry (ed. by Richard Le Gallienne). **The Poems of Arthur Henry Hallam.** London: Elkin Mathews and John Lane, 1893. First edition. Original parchment backed paper covered boards. The Large Paper Copy, "Limited to 75 Copies, 50 of Which Are For Sale." Rubricated title page, edges uncut, wide margins. An attractive and scarce book, rarely seen in original binding. (#1305)
- 41. Hood, Thomas, and John Hamilton Reynolds. **Odes and Addresses to Great People.** London: Baldwin, Cradock, & Joy, 1825. First edition. Original or contemporary boards with tape spine, paper label with lettering on cover. 136pp. Once an extremely rare book, now copies to be found of this curious volume with vignettes on various 'famous' people including "The Great Unknown, "The Champion of England," "Joseph Grimaldi" and others. Internally quite clean and bright. (#1326) \$225
- 42. Hunt, Leigh. **A Jar of Honey and Mount Hybla.** London: Smith, Elder & Co, 1848. First edition. Original color pictorial paper covered boards with exquisite and intricate designs on both covers and spine, originally decorated endpapers. Illustrated by Richard Doyle. Fragile covers show wear predominantly at outer edges and at spine leaving most, if not all of the pictorial images on both covers and spine in tact, a very rare survival considering the delicacy of the paper covering. At the time of research, we could not locate any other copies in the original binding. AEG. Internally clean and bright. (#802)
- 43. Hunt, Leigh. Juvenilia; or, A Collection of Poems. London: J. Whiting, 1803. Third edition. Bound in sumptuous full polished red calf with simple gilt-ruled borders by J. Larkins. Superb stippled engraving of Hunt as frontispiece and exquisite full-page engraving by Bartolozzi. Cover neatly detached, else near fine. (#1348) \$350

Two books bound in one volume. Half calf, marbled paper covered boards. Eight charming hand-colored woodcut illustrations by Henry Linton and M. Jackson. Binding rubbed, some soiling and foxing internally, but quite nice. (#974)
- 46. Johnston, David. Translations, Literal and Free, of the Dying Hadrian's Address to His Soul. Bath: Printed at the Chronicle Office, For Private Circulation, 1876. First edition. Original maroon fine wove cloth with central heavily gilt portrait (Hadrian) and four concentric rules, gilt lettering on spine, rear cover blindstamped. Beveled boards, AEG. Association Copy: Johnston has inscribed the book (1876) to Henry Julian Hunter who has made a contribution in the book (p.89) comprising his own translation of the poem. As well, there is a lengthy threepage autograph letter signed attached



from Johnston to Hunter (1876), a very interesting letter indeed inviting Hunter to make a contribution to the book and describing in some detail how he'd like to see it, "... may I ay that the number of literal translations rather accumulate under me and give a little lament. A rather free rhythmical translation might be preferable. But do not suppose that I prefer to push this upon you, whatever you are pleased to lend will be welcome..." and much more. Quite an interesting association and exchange for any Hadrian collection. Spine slightly sunned, else a stunning copy, fine. (#1306)



Scarce and early work on the predilections of individual taste. Binding worn with spine nearly worn off, rear cover detached. Still a very excellent copy internally and a good candidate for rebinding. (#983) \$450
- 48. Le Gallienne, Richard. **[Elkin Mathews Early Title] The Student and the Body-Snatcher and Other Trifles.** London: Elkin Matthews, 1890. First edition. Original smooth dark brown buckram, gold lettering on spine. One of the scarcer of all Elkin Matthews imprints, and a very early and rare Le Gallienne title (his third book). Spine chipped at head, cracked, else a clean and tight copy, very good. (#239) \$275
- 49. Le Gallienne, Richard. [Elkin Mathews Imprint, Limited to 100 Copies] Prose Fancies. London: Elkin Mathews and John Lane, 1894. First edition. 4to. Original drab paper-covered boards, paper label on spine. Limited to 100 Copies on Handmade Paper. Corners bumped, spine a little worn, flies foxed, else near fine internally, clean and bright. Very scarce Elkin Mathews imprint. (#191)
- 50. Levellee, Joseph. **Letters of Mameluke** Or A Moral and Critical picture of the manners of Paris. London: John Murray, 1804. First edition. Two Volumes. Full calf, gilt label. Moderate wear to covers, corners rubbed, on morocco label missing, foxing to prelims. Both volumes near fine internally. No copies located on net at time of writing. (#973) [see photo to left] \$650

- 52. MacDonald, George. **England's Antiphon.** London: Macmillan, [1868]. First edition. Original blue cloth with circular gilt seal on cover and spine, gilt lettering on spin, beveled boards.. Brown endpapers. Frontispiece and two full-page illustrations by Arthur Hughes. Nice copy, covers somewhat sunned in areas, but unobtrusive. Front hinge in tact, rear split. Very good internally. In the text of the book, a hand (presumably Lady Wilde's) has carefully corrected two out of the three errors as per the errata instructions. A most interesting historical connection, as Lady Wilde (i.e. "Speranza" as she came to be known under her pseudonym), or more properly, Jane Francesca Agnes Wilde, was an active author and suffragist and well-known in many literary circles at this time. Lady Wilde (the mother of Oscar Wilde) was at this time probably still reeling from the loss of her daughter, her husband (1876) and finding out she was all but bankrupt. As per the book, this is a very early title by the close friend of Dante Gabriel Rossetti and a key author and champion of the Pre-Raphaelite 'cause.' It was issued with and without plates, as many more copies were printed than number of illustrated plates. This copy does not have the illustrations.
