Wonderful colored etched title page and 24 plates (I, J and U, V are on the same plates). Cropped (though as published), with minor loss to a few letters, some foxing and soiling. The Peter Crossman copy, noted collector, with his bookplate. Most scarce, especially in original boards, this ABC excels where others fail, in wit and charm. Schwerdt I, p. 236. Half-title, tissue guards and errata slip at end, all present. 15 finely hand-colored aquatint plates by J.T. Rawlins heightened with gum Arabic. The first treatise devoted primarily pheasant rearing and the management and preservation of woodlands. Light foxing to tissue guards and some text leaves, plates generally clean and bright. Expertly bound by Bernard Middleton in half red morocco over superbly marbled boards, spine gilt in compartments with green morocco label, matching marbled endsheets. [text watermarked 1822, plates 1822-25]. The excessively rare Large Paper Copy, with 50 fine hand-colored soft-ground etchings by and after Alken, tissue guards, 2 preliminary leaves and first plate ('The Race Horse') torn across and neatly repaired, some light spotting or soiling, else fine. The Very rare large paper copy of the first edition with these plates. A previous work was published under the same title in 1821 but contained different plates (which were aquatints). Alken's masterpiece on popular sports, including scenes of horse-racing, hunting, coursing, shooting, angling, dog-fighting, cock-fighting, and bull, bear- & badger-baiting; as notable, Alken's preface condemns the baiting of animals, depicted in the last few plates. The only plate not including animals is of prize-fighting. (#3874)



The scarce first issue with 4 mounted plates, hand-colored engraved additional title with vignettes, portrait and 34 superb hand-colored plates by Henry Alken, four of which are trimmed and mounted as issued, extra-illustrated with two original states of two of the mounted plates (untrimmed and with original captions and imprints dated 1838), one with short marginal tears, plate at p.348 'The Tandem' in second state, 10pp. advertisements at end, some spotting, mostly to tissue guards, bookplate of Joel Spitz featuring portrait of Henry Alken and with his pencil note regarding the additional plates on front free endpaper. Covers rubbed, recased, new endpapers, preserved in cloth drop-back box (spine faded [Tooley 65]. Per Tooley, widely considered to be the premier colorplate sporting book in the 19th century. The two additional plates, both dated 1838, prove that the work was planned some time earlier but publication was delayed until 1842. The four plates already produced were then trimmed and mounted with new captions. (#3863)



[Superb ALS to Frank Chouteau Brown] ALS. 2pp. on 8vo laid paper with Auriol's stylized orange monogram at top left. ALS from George Auriol, French poet, songwriter, graphic and type designer and Art Nouveau artist, to Frank Chouteau Brown, American architect, editor of Architectural Review, and bookplate designer. Auriol had collaborated with Brown on a lettering article in Architectural Review and was planning another. Auriol, an accomplished and well-known French designer, became interested in the revival of historical type styles, and was heavily influenced by Eugene Grasset. "12th May, 1907, Dear Sir [Frank Choteau Brown], I shall send you with pleasure some specimens of my types, as I apply myself much of typography... The patterns that you send me, show only capital letters. Please tell me if I must do the same or give capitals and little letters mixed. I have drawn several types but I think of given you [sic] preferably my personal type (Auriol's Zyne) actually in foundry... Yours very truly, George Auriol, George Auriol 59 Rue Letric, Paris (xviii) PS If you would like as well, I should prefer to give you a page of text than an alphabet. I am writing actually a book of monograms and marks contain more than four hundred monograms that I have designed." etc. With original envelope postmarked Boston, May 23, 1901 and hand-addressed to Mr. Frank Chouteau Brown, etc. (#3898) \$450.00

The British Battledore, 2 copies, one pink, one vellow; The Child's Battledore; Union Battledore; Youth's Battledore; English Battledore; New Battledore, all 130 x 82mm. (size when folded closed), all colored card, "Price One Penny." "Davison's British Battledore, which has three alphabets, a syllabary and two reading lessons, included cuts by Thomas Bewick. Davison kept a large stock of Bewick blocks which he frequently reused." [Cherryburn Times, The Newsletter of The Bewick Society, volume 4, number 8]. Probably not all the woodcuts on the battledores are by Bewick. A wonderfully preserved set, very good to near fine. 



Castiglione, Count Baldesar (Opdycke, L. E. transl). The Book of the Courtier. New York: Charles Scribner's Sons, 1901. First edition thus. Tall, thick quarto. Exquisitely bound in 1902 by the famous French bookbinder, Petrus Ruban (1851-1929) in full deep red crushed morocco with a striking hand-tooled Grolieresque design on the front and back covers, geometric design & gilt lettering to spine, wide gilttooled dentelles with moiré silk endpapers and marbled paper flyleaves. Side edges of binding with gilt double ruling, and top and bottom of spine with gilt crosshatches. Signed in gilt pallet by Ruban bottom of front dentelle: "P. Ruban 1902." Differing from many of his colleagues, Ruban was both binder and designer/finisher, and his bindings were distinguished by complex and iconic decorations in the working of leather. One of the most renowned bookbinders at the turn of the century in France, Ruban showed at various important exhibitions, including the 1889 World's Fair, where his bindings were noted for their originality. There he won a silver medal, and it was reported by the organizers that "Mr. Ruban exhibited very successful bindings, continuing to study the fine models left by the masters of past centuries and the bindings of our modern artists, both in terms of perfect constitution of the body of work and the cover that under that of decoration in gilding correct and well nourished ... " 500 copies, #196. 71 portraits and fifteen autographs reproduced by Edward Bierstadt. 8.25 x 11.25 inches. All edges gilt. Supremely well-preserved with almost no signs of wear. Very fine. Spine in six compartments with gilt titles and 4 of the 6 compartments duplicating the cover design in smaller module miniatures. Gilt ruled turn-ins and signed "19 AP 04" in the rear of each volume. Green endpapers and flyleaves. The bindings are in fine condition with absolutely no signs of wear. An early example of Alice Pattinson's fine work, one of Douglas Cockerell's students, who set up shop in London in 1902. According to Tidcombe, "She received a good deal of praise for her bindings, which were illustrated in "Art Workers Quarterly, Art Journal and The art of he Book. Pattinson's early work was designed, bound and finished by herself, under the oversight of Douglas Cockerell, but at some point she came to rely on George Fisher for finishing, who at that time, was one of the finest finishers in England. design. lower left of front cover), exquisitely tooled and modeled using rectilinear framing motif with central crown and arms, and elegant flowing vine and blossom patterning, gilt dots and circles as blossoms intermixed as well as stippled borders and framing; similar modeling pattern on spine, but with added all-over gold dot pattern in areas. Gilt interlocking design on edges of calf boards. Attractive pastedowns and endsheets with light blue stenciled design. Exquisite color portrait frontispiece and 23 plates, 18 vignettes to the text, all with tissue guards with descriptive letterpress; decorative initials at head of each chapter. Spotting to covers and wear to edges & spine tips; rubbing to outer hinges and inner hinges slightly cracked, binding still solid. "Some of the bindings [Alice Shepherd] did...were bound by Fazakerley... but she is best known for her work for the trade binder Cedric Chivers. She began working for Chivers... in about 1897, where she was in charge of a department of about five women doing cut and modeled calf work. Her method was to mark the design on the damp leather, and then scrape the under (flesh) side of the leather with an ivory tool, to make a hollow within the area of the design. The hollow was filled with cement, and then, by manipulation and pressure, the design was brought into relief on the upper (hair) side of the leather. Any gilding, coloring, or finishing was done after the book was bound." (Women Bookbinders, Tidcombe, p. 95). Bindings by Shepherd are quite scarce, and this is certainly one of the more prodigious ones we have seen. (#3903) \$2,250.00

Clarke Conwell, along with his talented wife Helen Marguerite O'Kane (artist and designer), first began operations in New York, but quickly moved to the suburb of New Rochelle in 1901. Conwell's vision and design elements closely modeled William Morris both in terms of form and function. Written in Ricketts' spare script: "To V.F. from C.R., 1919." The decorative bookplate of Vivian Forbes (designed by Forbes) is affixed to front pastedown. Forbes died tragically at the age of 46, committing suicide following the death of Philpot. Like Philpot, Forbes' work was affected by concern over the rise of fascism in Europe, and he was immediately influenced by the 19th century Aestheticism movement, and painters like Charles Ricketts and Shannon, the

former taking him on as a protégé. "We have taken a great liking to Forbes, the sensual beast who ate my strawberries at Chilham," wrote Ricketts to Thomas Lowinsky, in December 1918. According to Ricketts' biographer, Forbes "brought out that side of Ricketts which vearned to guide younger men through the thickets of art and culture." From Paul van Capelleveen's excellent blog on Charles Ricketts: (http://charlesricketts.blogspot.com): "Philpot's work was influenced by that of Ricketts and Shannon, and when the two older artists left Lansdowne House for Townshend House, Forbes and Philpot moved into their former flats and studios. Although Ricketts & Shannon and Forbes & Philpot knew each other, they never became close friends. They probably met in about 1918, and Ricketts took a liking for the lesser talented Forbes, about whom he wrote to Gordon Bottomley, 29 May 1919: 'The war caught him when hardly a man, and he is seeing Russian ballets, National Gallery pictures, and hearing Wagner or Chopin as novelties.' Ricketts and Shannon had a country retreat, the Keep of Chilham Castle in Kent, which had been purchased by their friend Edmund Davis."" This inscription by Ricketts to Forbes is the only one we can locate, and appears early on in Forbes' budding career as an artist. A fine copy. Ricketts fine association copies are very scarce. A fascinating further illumination of how this scarce and important trial bookplate came to be, is given by the Ricketts scholar, Paul van Capelleveen: "What was the use of this bookplate? It was not meant for the private libraries of Copeland and Day, nor for books sold by the firm, but apparently in use as 'office copies' that were kept on the shelves of the firm. At least one book bearing this bookplate has been identified: it is a copy of Oscar Wilde's Salome (1894) that was sold at auction in 2009. The bookplate was printed in green, Kraus recorded. However, a few copies have been printed in black. These may have been proof copies. One such copy can be found in the Carl Woodring Collection, Woodson Research Center, Rice University, Houston, Texas. Another copy was recently sold at auction. Both copies, printed in green and in black, are quite rare, and more difficult to find than a copy of The Sphinx. The design is very much in style with The Sphinx drawings and lettering. The full-page illustrations form the images for "The Book of the Child," which was published by Stokes in 1903. Both were issued very nearly the same time, and records do not clearly indicate which came out first, the calendar or the book. It is clear that Beck had the copyright in 1902, which is given on the cover page of the calendar, which is also given on the copyright page of Stokes' "Book of the Child." The production of the illustrations for the book were documented by Smith, giving details on live modeling, staging, props needed to keep the children still, etc. The process of color printing by Beck was cutting edge, employing a chemotype process which was invented by one of Beck's parent companies in 1894.
